MINUTES FROM THE 2007 ANNUAL MEETING

Jan. 28, 2007

RECTOR'S REPORT:

1. Fr. Dave drew everyone's attention to the front cover of the Annual Report which showed a bar graph of our increasing attendance over a ten year period. We are growing. This growing is a blessing but it is also a difficult phase. We are becoming too large for our space and having only just one rector. To correct this, we must either become larger or get more members for more pledges to pay for this or we will become smaller. Finding a part time rector and adding space will not be cheap. One of our top priority items was dry Sunday School rooms with a bathroom and running water. We also need to dig up

shrubbery on the far side of the Parish Hall and install a plastic barrier along the basement wall. Through all of this change, we need to keep the mission of love for one another in the forefront.

2. Fr. Dave discussed the new procedure on prayer and asked if there were any questions. None were asked.

FINANCE REPORT-

Dennis Reid

Dennis thanked everyone for their help over the past 6 years.

Recap of 2006

1. Last year we operated with a deficient budget of \$29,000
2. Late summer, were very concerned that it was looking more like a \$30,000 deficient.

At this time, a letter was sent to the congregation explaining the situation.

3. Things brightened in the fall. Pledging increased 105%. Two bequests came in and were not designated to any one area. Special offerings were higher. Expenses were less than anticipated. Utilities were down because of warm weather. Committees kept their expenses down. Did not have to draw down any additional dollars than those already planned for.
4. We can be very proud of our outreach. We budget \$10,000 for outreach. \$15,000 is raised in other areas, the Carnival, fall rummage sale, Christmas table. We contribute \$16,490 to the Diocese which is used for outreach. Our total to outreach is \$41,725.

Investments

1. 2006 was a stellar year for our investments. We saw an 11 ½% increase. Our Fund started when we sold the Boyer House. This was 1.75 million invested with Merrill Lynch. Wendell Barnett was our advisor. When he left Merrill Lynch and went to Wachovia, we followed him with our investments. We were able to save \$5,000 in fees with Wachovia. Wendell had more freedom at Wachovia to adjust our investments. We had 1.5 million and after a 25% draw down, we are still worth 1.12 million today.

2007 Budget

1. Ministry teams presented their budgets. The budget for this year is \$428,108 which represents a 6% growth. The team has pledged not to draw down more than \$110,000. Each year will try to decrease this amount. The budget is still in deficient but is \$26,000 this year which is \$3,000 less than last year.
2. Goals for the future are to figure out ways to get to a balanced budget and ways to raise more money and to cut down expenses.
3. Annual pledge to the diocese. We are putting the money aside. But will withhold funding until the matter with the Bishop is resolved. We will start a new account with Wachovia to hold this money.
4. Dennis thanked Fr. Dave, the Vestry and the Ministry teams. He also thanked John Dziel for handling the day to day financial items of the church.

Meeting Continues with Fr. Dave

1. Our size church—200 a Sunday. Have to spend more than we have. Need to get to 250 to get to be large enough to get the money needed. The average size of an Episcopal church is 75 people a Sunday.
2. Issue with Bishop-The Standing Committee made a complaint to the Presiding Bishop about the spending of certain funds. She has until Feb. 6 to refuse it or turn it over to the House of Bishops
3. The issue of the Sexual Abuse has been turned over to the National Church since 4 Bishops were involved in the cover up.
4. Next Vestry meeting in Feb. - the Bishop has asked to attend.

Ended at 12:55 with the enthusiastic singing of “Lift High the Cross”.

The Rector's Report

Fr Dave Canan

FELLOWSHIP

In the baptismal covenant we promise to devote ourselves to the apostles teaching, the fellowship, the breaking of the bread and the prayers. The basis of that baptismal promise is from a description of the earliest church in the Book of Acts.

In Greek, the language of the New Testament, the word for fellowship is koinonia. The essential meaning of koinonia embraces concepts conveyed in the English terms: fellowship, association, community, communion, joint participation, sharing and intimacy. The word appears 19 times in most editions of the Greek New Testament. In the [New Testament](#), the basis of fellowship begins with a mystical joining of [Jesus Christ](#) with each believer. This union is to be experienced in practical daily life. The same bonds that link the individual to [Jesus](#) also link him or her with other believers. The [New Testament](#) letters describe those bonds as so vital and genuine that a deep level of intimacy can be experienced among the members of a local church.

That's what I desire for Trinity Church: bonds so vital and genuine that deep levels of intimacy with God and one another can be experienced among our members.

A couple of months ago one of our every Sunday members was very hurt. She had been absent 8 Sundays and I hadn't noticed. I was devastated by my oversight because I cherish this person. This was not the first or only person whose absence I didn't notice and I pray that it won't be the last. I was just thankful that this member did not leave us.

As I was beating myself up because of this oversight a colleague reminded me that it's not just the Rector, but every member of Trinity Church, who is responsible for our community. This colleague also reminded me that in a parish of our size we must be very intentional in developing "systems" for our mutual care.

To strengthen, deepen, and provide for meaningful fellowship at Trinity Church we are implementing several practices.

1. Every member or family who has not been in church for one month will be contacted by me or a vestry member to make sure everything is alright and what we might do to help them get to church.
2. We will offer several welcome classes each year to orient newcomers to Trinity church, allow them to meet parish leaders, and to connect them to people and ministries at the church.
3. We will provide more opportunities for members to get to know each other like dinners or outreach projects.
4. We will continue to provide small group opportunities where relationships are formed like mid-week Eucharists, Bible studies, the choir, and Education for Ministry.

Now here's what our leaders and each one of our members need to do so that we will have meaningful fellowship.

1. Attend Church regularly; regularly is most Sundays.
2. Become involved in a small group worship, study, fellowship or ministry.
3. Introduce yourself to people you don't know. That's the work of every one of us no matter if we have been here 3 weeks or 30 years.
4. Let me or a vestry member know if you see someone is missing. We'll follow up. Let us know when someone is hurting.
5. If you have a need, let us know; this church loves to care for its members but we have to know!!
6. Saving the most important for the last, because of that mystical union with Jesus part of koinonia is to practice the essential Christian disciplines of daily prayer and scripture meditation.

That's it; that's my vision for 2008. Koinonia.

The Rector's Warden Report

Fellowship, or koinonia, is the theme for this year's annual meeting. In a church, community and fellowship work and exist together to be effective. The parishioners that make up a church must be in community and fellowship with each other to practice the work of Christ. This has always been true. Christ shows us this in the Bible, in fact when telling his disciples to spread the word; he sent them out in pairs. Followers of Christ, then and now, work and share their experiences together.

For the past 10 years, Trinity has continued to grow into a welcoming and friendly church. That is a direct reflection on our members and Fr Dave. Everyone at Trinity has worked hard and volunteered for many ministries to help our church grow. Now Trinity has reached an important stage of development. We are currently at a size that is the most difficult to keep track of individuals and how they are doing in their lives away from Trinity. It was easy when 100 people came to church on Sunday, but in 2007 we averaged 211 each week.

This is where koinonia, or fellowship, comes in. As Fr Dave states in his report, each of us must become more conscious of everyone around us. The best way to do this is to become active in small groups and ministries. Some ministries Trinity offers are listed in the annual report. There is also a ministries pamphlet in the narthex and online that describes various ones in which to become involved. A lot of ministries come from an idea that a parishioner has. One person can make a difference with new ideas or new ways to do what we are currently working on. Trinity has everything from mission and outreach ministries to crafting ministries. Each ministry should become a small community where we look out and care for one another. Where we can share with each other. If you can't commit to one particular group at this time, parish dinners are being planned. These are always fun and a fabulous way to meet other parishioners. If anyone would like help finding a ministry that is right for them, I would be happy to assist.

We should all be proud of everything we have accomplished at Trinity. The youth ministries are growing. The music program is thriving. There are services 5 days a week. There are two Education for Ministry classes. There is a Bible Study class offered. A strong and devoted core of LEMs take communion to the sick and homebound. We have a weekly Lenten program offered each year. Basically, there is always something happening everyday at Trinity.

On a personal note, as I am leaving my Vestry ministry after seven years I would like to thank Fr Dave and everyone I have worked with these years. I very special thank you to John Dziel, Sheila Bistany, and Eddie Black for all the help they have been to me. It has been a pleasure and an honor to serve on Vestry and I encourage everyone to think of serving Trinity in this way.

The Accounting Warden's Report

Trinity Ambler continues to be financially solid! Although 2007 presented financial challenges, we met all financial obligations and our investments appreciated over the past year. Our total 2007 operating budget was \$420,852. Our pledge and plate offerings total just over \$271,000, which was an increase of 5% over 2006. We successfully funded various outreach programs (approximately \$32,000) from our operating budget and through parish events including the Carnival, rummage sale and Christmas craft fair. **We funded various maintenance projects including a new basement bathroom.** Our investments totaled \$1,841,123, which increased approximately 7% over the past year.

Key Points in 2008 and Beyond:

- The 2008 operating budget is \$445,814. It includes a spending deficit of approximately \$25,000. Past budgets have included deficits and we overcame these deficits through reduced spending and higher income (plate, pledges, bequests, etc). In 2007, however, our deficit was partially covered by an increase in withdrawals from our investments (\$6,000). This year, we expect to cover our deficit without increasing our planned withdrawals from our investments. We will continue to count on your pledges and gifts.
- As in the past, withdrawal from our Boyer Fund investment makes up a considerable portion of our operating income. The balance in the Fund as of 31 December 2007 is \$963,372. In 2007, we withdrew \$120,000 from the Fund, which represented 28.5% of our operating income. For 2008, we plan to withdraw \$114,000, which is 27.1% of our operating income. Although the trend is positive, we must strive to reduce our withdrawals from investments to cover operating expenses. A withdrawal rate equal to 25% of budgeted income shows no immediate problem. However, if we will continue to withdraw at this rate, the Fund will be exhausted in about 10 years.
- Ministry leaders and their teams have done an excellent job raising money for ministries and controlling expenses. We - the entire congregation - should be proud of our achievements. We look forward to continued leadership and support.

The Music Director's Report

The year 2007 was an exciting time for the music program here at Trinity. The music department continues to be reflective of the parish at large; people's lives change, and they move in and out of our own lives. Change is constant. Yet, the music program continues to grow and provides evidence of the health and vitality of the parish.

The Choirs:

The choir system at Trinity is comprised of three choirs, the Cherub Choir for children younger than eight years of age, the Youth Choir, which includes those eight years and older, and the Trinity Choir, which is the adult choir. The basic responsibility of the choirs is to assist the rector in leading the congregation through the musical parts of the worship service. Their presentation of anthems and other music enhances the services and, hopefully, inspires the congregation.

The Cherub Choir is comprised largely of enthusiastic children in Godly Play. Under the direction of Maureen McCauley with occasional assistance from Barb Davis and Mindy Cutcher, these children sing usually on the first Sunday of the month. Maureen is always looking for assistance, so if you'd like to help, please contact her.

One of the exciting things that occurred in the music department this past fall was the revival of the Youth Choir. We now have enough people to form a viable choir. They meet and rehearse for a brief time on Sundays following the Eucharist. My wish would be that older youth would join the choir, but older youth become increasingly active young adults, and there is just no time in their schedules for rehearsing.

The Trinity Choir continues to experience growth in membership, and now consists of 33 members when all are present. Two additional people have indicated that they will shortly join the choir. For me, this is very exciting as well as gratifying. The commitment and dedication to weekly rehearsals and participation in the worship service easily make this group in my opinion the most dedicated one in the parish. In keeping with the philosophy of the Director of Music, no auditions are necessary and everyone is welcome regardless of musical ability. In other words, if you can carry a tune, you are welcome to join us. There is exceptional talent in this choir, and their offerings of solos add much to the worship service. Special thanks go to Barb and Bill Davis, Doug Purvis and Joe DeTato. The Trinity Choir has two section leaders: Andrea Petska, Alto, and Herb Ruzann, Bass. The search for a tenor section leader continues. The choir meets on Thursday evenings at 7:30 and sings from the Sunday after Labor Day to the end of June, as well as various holidays during the Church Year. My heartfelt thanks are extended to each and every member, with special thanks to Maureen McCauley, who handles the robe inventory, and Nancy Dixon, who helps as the Trinity Choir's librarian.

I would still like to pursue the idea of forming a Family Choir, where children and adults who are usually unable to commit the time to being in a choir regularly will be able occasionally to get together as a choir on a Sunday morning to sing something uncomplicated, yet still be in a choir.

Instrumentalists:

Trinity is blessed with much talent within the parish and further blessed in that its members so voluntarily offer their talents to the worship service. Some are actual music professionals and others are eager volunteers who just play or sing beautifully. There are so many people to thank that one risks omitting a name, but our thanks are extended to Anne Canan, Mindy Cutcher, John Dively, Patricia Martin, Maureen McCauley and Joe DeTato. Special thanks go to Ernest Wells, who occasionally substitutes for the Director of Music and helped accompany an anthem at the Trinity Choir's Christmas Concert.

Musical Instruments:

Trinity's Schantz pipe organ continues to attract attention both locally and nationally because of its unique and successful design, as well as its magnificent sound. Occasionally, requests are made from organizations outside of Trinity who wish to utilize it. Pipe organs are complicated mechanisms, and Trinity's is no exception. It continues to be maintained by Patrick J. Murphy and Associates, Inc. Trinity's organ is tuned only twice a year compared to the usual three or four times other churches' organs require. This is largely due to the stability in temperature in the sanctuary. In addition to the Schantz organ, Trinity also has a Rogers electronic organ in the parish hall, a gift of Susan Adair from the estate of Elizabeth "Betty" Adair.

Trinity currently has three pianos: an Everett grand piano from the estate of Elizabeth Adair; a Baldwin spinet from the estate of Robert "Bob" Gallagher; and a Sambrick console from the family of Gladys Gould. They are all maintained by George Husted of North Wales.

Conclusion:

The Music Department, in conclusion, had an active year. Trinity's annual Service of Advent Lessons and Carols was presented on December 2. A new Christmas Pageant, "Christmas with St. Mary," in conjunction with the Church School, was presented on December 16 with much success, followed in the afternoon by a spectacular concert given by the Trinity Choir and soloists and instrumentalists. This is in addition to the other Sundays and commemorative events of the Church Year, such as Ash Wednesday and the Vigil of Easter.

The success of the Trinity Choir and the accomplishments of Trinity Parish in its vibrant life in the community come from the same source. It is because the people here at Trinity live out their ministries in their organizations, care for one another and wish to help one another as a way of spreading Christ's gospel. One can trace this directly to Father Canan's own philosophy and his ministry. I am honored and yet grateful to be part of this organization.

Committee Reports

Adult Formation

Cheryl Bayard

We offer a variety of ways for adults to continue their spiritual journey here at Trinity Ambler. Year round programs include EFM-“Education for Ministry” which is a four year program of Old Testament, New Testament, Church History, and Theology. And a separate group that is doing a bible study of the Synoptic Gospels. EFM has two separate sessions; one on Monday evening and one Wednesday morning. The EFM mentors are Fr. Dave, Jeff Lawrence, Al Mathis and Jay Walton. The bible study group is lead by Karen Reid and meets Friday at noon.

Last year on March 9 and 10, we held a Discovery Workshop which was a two day seminar exploring such questions as: Why are we here? What do we do best? What do we value? This workshop will be repeated in 2008. We had a quiet day in Lent and in Advent. The one in Lent was sponsored by the Diocese and the one in Advent was put on by our own members. And on Nov. 26, a group from Trinity Ambler went to hear Rob Bell’s speaking tour on “The Gods Aren’t Angry”.

Communications

One of the difficult aspects of publishing the Chimes newsletter and maintaining the web site is the lack of feedback. It's hard to know what people think of the way things are being done in the absence of any input. So early in the year we solicited feedback about the Chimes by handing out a short questionnaire. The majority of the comments about the contents of the Chimes were positive so we seem to be on the right track.

Several years ago we stopped mailing out the Chimes to every parishioner and made it available for downloading from the web site. An email notice let everyone know when a new issue was available. The primary goal was to reduce the mailing costs and to a lesser extent the printing costs for distributing each issue and to allow the Chimes to be viewed in full color (we were only printing in black and white at the time). For anyone still wishing to receive a printed copy in the mail we maintained a list for mailing. It occurred to the committee that we had no way to measure whether or not people in the parish were actually taking the time to download the Chimes and read it. So we included a section on the questionnaire to assess preferences for receiving the Chimes. What we found is that the vast majority of parishioners would prefer a printed copy. In fact most of the people that had requested a copy mailed to their homes really just wanted a printed copy so that they did not have to download it and were willing to pick it up on Sunday morning to help save the mailing costs. Based on this feedback we adopted a practice of printing a large number of full color copies for distribution in the narthex. Our cost to print these in color has come down significantly in recent years so it is no longer prohibitive to do so. A holder was placed on the wall to the right of the main doors as you exit the Narthex toward the parking lot and it contains the current issue as well as some back issues. We still send out the emails and the current and past issues of the Chimes are available on the web site for download at any time. In addition anyone who wants the Chimes mailed to them may still receive it by contacting the office. We hope that this will strike the proper balance of making it convenient for everyone to obtain the Chimes while still controlling costs.

John Dziel continues to update our web site and add new items. This is another area where we receive very little feedback so please let us know if you have ideas for improvements in any area.

During the weekend, our empty mugs were filled with words of wisdom from Maxine on topics including "openness", "brokenness", "compassion" and "fulfillment". She also taught us the technique of the "breath prayer", especially wonderful for all of us on the run. Ginny Guyer, our "Music Czarina", and Nina Greco led us in making joyful noises and songs to the Lord! On Saturday, we had the opportunity to participate in a video being made for the Sisters of St. John the Baptist, take a tour of the convent, and participate in Vespers in the convent chapel. The afternoon also included time for quiet meditation, reading, naps, and walks around the lovely grounds and labyrinth. In addition, there were special times for relaxation, conversations, laughter, sing-alongs and beauty treatments. As we left St. Marguerite's on Sunday, plans were already being made for our retreat in October 2008!

Mission and Outreach

Trinity Ambler continued its dedication to Mission & Outreach activities in 2007. We met our outreach goals of helping people locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally. A lot of what everyone does weekly at Trinity is Mission and Outreach. Here is some of what we accomplished in the community.

Again last year we successfully hosted a family of a mom and dad and six children in April in our annual participation in the Inter Faith Housing Network. We did it with many of you who graciously volunteered in providing dinners, transportation, linen laundering, and overnight company to the Family. For Easter, the Outreach budget provided money to purchase Easter basket items for all of the children.

A happy note: soon after the family left church they found affordable housing in Ambler and settled into a new home. The mother who had been pregnant in April, had her baby in June and a few volunteers from Trinity brought her meals to make things easier for the family. A true example of our compassion and

willingness to help. We have Mark Bilodeau to thank for coordinating this most successful effort with an assist from his wife Kate and of course many of you.

Next, we gave financial assistance again to both The Community Cupboard and Inter Faith Housing giving each \$2400 over the course of the year.

Real Men Cook again prepared frozen meals and soups for, Aid for Friends in Philadelphia and Montgomery counties for which we contributed \$700.

Over the year we also gave \$2400 to Episcopal Services to carry on their essential work.

The 2007 Spring Carnival afforded us \$7500 to allocate among seven worthy recipients. They were: \$2000 to the Diocese of Mississippi to carry on their rebuilding work, \$1000 to Chester Eastside, \$1050 to MWMBBA (an organization dedicated to helping talented young women and men receive an education they would never have been able to realize without help), \$1000 to Campus Ministries(and organization to lead college youth into a closer relationship with Christ), \$1000 to the Church Of The Advocate (an organization who along with other churches serves hot meals to 150 to 200 people per day among other community activities), \$1000 to our Seminarian Karynjean Dickoff and \$450 to the Visiting Nurse Association to help a local disabled family make their house completely clean and livable.

From the above report you may see that our Mission & Outreach activities are in full swing and we may be proud of our accomplishments while realizing there is more we can do in 2008.

A final note: Steve Chester and I had an opportunity to deliver a number of Christmas gifts to a mother with six children living in Ambler. The look of amazement, joy, gratitude on her face showed how vital and rewarding Outreach can be.

Our Eucharistic Ministers visit a number of different parishioners on a continuous basis both at home and in hospital/hospice situations.

Our group has also engaged in several seminars this year to expand our knowledge base in serving our parishioners thereby improving our abilities in providing this ministry.

- *Trinity's Parish Nurse*

Mrs. Jennifer Prater faithfully continues to serve our Trinity Family in this capacity by providing knowledge and information regarding available medical services in Montgomery County. She has enabled both individuals and families to access services specific to their needs.

- *Meals for Individuals and Families in Special Circumstances*

Mrs. Lynda Basham and Mrs. Annette Irvin coordinate the volunteers who provide this periodically much needed ministry to our parishioners. Persons in need of these services contact Fr. Dave for a referral to this committee. This year we have served several individuals and families.

- *Transportation for our Elderly and Disabled*

Need a ride to church for Mass? Kindly contact Mr. Stephen Chester or Mr. Roy Irwin for assistance. Kudos to Mr. Chester who brings a parishioner to church on a regular basis.

- *Parents of Teens Library and Websites*

The library is located directly beneath the mailboxes in the Narthex. Especially selected texts that address adolescent guidance are available for borrowing. Parents who have borrowed texts and left mini-reviews have helped other borrowers.

Newer texts have been added to the original collections that address specific problems of young people; some discuss problems elementary school students face i.e., bullying and/or teasing. Others assist specific family and youngster needs such as improved relationships of separated/divorced households. Yet others serve to provide advice on strengthening mother-daughter and father-son relationships.

If you borrow a book, kindly leave a brief review for the next parent. We ask that parents pre-read all texts that are written expressly for teens to ascertain that the philosophy coincides with that of their family.

Book reviews are now being posted in the Chimes. Useful websites addressing adolescent/parent assistance are listed on the Chimes Winter 2006 Pastoral Care Corner; these are still applicable to today's situation.

Property

Similar to our congregation here at Trinity, over the course of 2007 the Property Committee has continued its upward momentum. Our diligent and dedicated small group of volunteers has once again gone above and beyond to improve our building and grounds for everyone to enjoy.

The Property Committee has again tackled some very necessary and large scale projects that have saved Trinity an extensive amount of money. Aside from the ongoing leak-prevention in the buildings and general painting and light bulb maintenance, the volunteer crew completed the following:

- Spring Clean-up of the Grounds.
- Sealing of the Sanctuary floor.
- Mulching the outside landscape beds over the summer.
- Installation of the church kitchen garbage disposal.
- Installation of the Church School restroom in the basement.
- Fall Clean-up and extensive small stump removal.
- Installation of weed-mat and decorative stone outside around the office air handling units.
- Pruning of the Oak trees along Bethlehem Pike for liability reasons.
- Installation of a water softener system in the Rectory.
- Overdue installation of drainage devices around the Rectory allowing for a dry basement, the first time in years!
- An involved and extremely laborious job of grading a drainage swale on the parking lot side of the rectory in November.
- Partial completion of paving over the handicapped-access at the rear entrance of the church.

Although this list is far from complete, it does exemplify the efforts of our volunteers. Thank you one and all for your time and talents you have given to Trinity in 2007.

A huge thank you must also be extended to the Finance Committee and Jay Walton. The Finance Committee has diligently worked to accommodate Property's request for funds into the budget the last two years. We have put in extensive time to realize the actual needs of the property and include those projects in the proposed budget. Without the support and effort of the Finance Committee, the property would be far from its present level of well-being. Additionally, Jay Walton has personally completed an extreme amount of work while living in the church cottage. Aside from assisting with weed pulling and the planting of

annuals, he has cut down overgrown brush, had the interior of the cottage completely painted and has worked at clearing out the leftover debris and old appliances in the basement from years past. Thank you.

The coming months are set to be just as busy for the Property Committee. Again, we have plans for completing projects that are very much needed. Some of these projects are: resolving the drainage problem on the Rhododendron-side of the Parish Hall, removing the carpet and installing commercial tile floors in the remaining church school rooms, inspecting and possibly replacing the Cottage furnace, seal coating and striping the parking lot all while continuing with the outside grounds maintenance, roofing needs on all buildings, indoor painting projects, and ceiling tile / light bulb replacement needs throughout the buildings.

Again in the summer of 2007 Trinity Church cooperated with Christ Church, Pottstown; St. Matthew's, Maple Glen; and St. Thomas', Church, Whitmarsh for our annual summer mission trip. This was for us, the largest group ever: 35 teens and 10 adults. With such a large group it should have been no surprise that the luggage of 5 of us did not arrive in New Orleans when we did!

The group was so large that we were housed in two facilities that were across town from each other, Grace Lutheran Church and the Urban Ministries Center. The Urban Ministry Center is a Victorian house next to the Episcopal Cathedral in New Orleans that was purchased and restored for the purpose of housing hurricane recovery volunteers. Both facilities provided beds and air mattresses: a real treat!

The destruction of Hurricane Katrina was evident everywhere. We came to New Orleans expecting to gut and repair homes destroyed by the storm. We arrived at a point of transition in the recovery work. The first big change was the gutting efforts had concluded just as we arrived. (Mind you that was 2 years after the hurricane and only the gutting had concluded.) Another change was that the Episcopal Jericho Road project had that week begun a cooperative effort with another recovery ministry to coordinate and supervise construction efforts. It turned out that the people doing the actual coordination and supervision were never told about the new cooperative venture and there was not enough work for our group so our mission trip was designed on the spot. Even with this huge challenge we accomplished much.

1. Neighborhood clean up.
2. Landscaping at a new home sites and Grace Church.
3. Visiting homebound folks serviced by the Diocese of New Orleans mobile respite unit.
4. Working at an Episcopal day camp.
5. Finishing work on recovery projects at Grace Church.
6. Finishing repair projects for elderly members of Grace Church.

We left New Orleans with a deep respect for the courage and strength of the good people of New Orleans. We left very proud of the many well coordinated recovery efforts of the Episcopal Diocese of Louisiana. We left humbled by the grace and faith of people who had endured so much.
